## Principal Perspectives by Craig Sundberg "Safe Haven for Learning"

When surveyed as to characteristics of a successful school, most parents agreed that the provision of a safe and protected school environment within which our students can flourish both academically and socially is of the utmost importance. This notion is also shared widely by staff and administration alike.

As a staff, we contend that the most important factor in meeting the needs of our students lies in the creation of a safe school climate. The solution in making schools safe is not adhering to a strict zero tolerance policy, but is grounded in the need to create positive interventions that get at the root of any difficulty. We know that a healthy and safe environment will produce optimal learning experiences.

At Turtle Lake, parents report that they strongly feel that we provide a safe and welcoming environment while providing clear expectations for positive student behavior. Addressing behavior issues and dealing with them fairly and consistently is very important to our staff. School safety is *everyone's* business. The best safety effort will involve all aspects of your child's school, including classroom instruction, school services and our school climate.

I recognize that with over 900 students, the very idea of school safety can be overwhelming and perhaps somewhat intimidating. The one thing that really sticks with me is the frequent feedback I get from visitors who are at our school for a variety of reasons. The general theme that I so often get is "Wow, are your students ever good here!" I even received a phone call last week from someone who happened to be at the McDonald's that our band was at during a day of multiple performances. He said he was blown away by our students' positive behavior and courteous mannerisms. On a weekly basis we have people visiting our school who comment in similar ways.

## Principal Perspectives continued...

Positive student behavior and having high expectations is a priority for our parents. Does this mean that we don't have issues and concerns? Of course not. The question is whether we have systems in place to deal in a proactive manner with anticipated misbehavior and misconduct. The rule of thumb that I have is to encourage our staff to respond immediately with what may be considered the “small” stuff. If this is done in a consistent and equitable manner, we can certainly minimize the “bigger” stuff.

What is the small stuff? I guess when I was in elementary school the most immediate concerns were chewing gum and running in the halls. Behavioral concerns have changed over the years. Issues of respect and personal safety take center stage now. Students emulate role models who are questionable. Television and movies influence our students in both offensive language and violent conduct. How do we respond to misbehavior?

- Our staff consists of specialized personnel who have training and expertise in dealing with behavioral issues.
- Our psychologist, social worker, behavior manager, student services assistant, special education staff, all are equipped to handle situations as they arise.
- Our classroom teachers do an exemplary job of integrating facets of a preventative health curriculum into core curriculum discussions and lessons. Students become aware of choices they have and options for reacting.

We have two district wide programs that are housed in our building. Students are mainstreamed into heterogeneous classrooms as much as possible. Many of these students are accompanied by necessary personnel who provide support and additional assistance to the mainstream teacher. So many of our students benefit from being positive mentors and role models to many of these children.

I recognize that communication is a vital key to sustaining a safe school environment. I urge you to call me or Mr. Johnson should you feel further discussion is warranted. We, like you, take school safety very seriously and want to assist in any manner we can. I welcome any input you feel would be beneficial to the overall safety of our building.

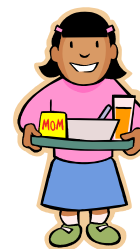


## 2008-2009 School Year Bus Information

**Registration** – The district office will be mailing bus registration information the first week of May. Registration forms are due June 6<sup>th</sup>. The bus fee for students living less than two miles from school will be \$225 per student, if paid before June 6<sup>th</sup> with a family cap of \$500 per year. If paid after June 6<sup>th</sup>, the fee is \$250 per student with a family cap of \$575. New families registering after June 6<sup>th</sup> will still be charged the \$225 fee per student. If paying by check, you may send the registration either to the district office or school. If paying by cash, Visa, or MasterCard, you must go in person to the Snail Lake Education Center at 350 Hwy 96 W, Shoreview.

## Lunch Account Reminder

Beginning May 16th students must have enough money in their accounts to cover their lunch each day. After May 21st, students will not be allowed to have a negative balance. If there is not enough money in your child's account, they will receive a peanut butter sandwich and milk. We will be taking deposits through the end of the school year. ## MATH OLYMPIAD

Due to the generosity of the 621 Foundation Turtle Lake School had 4 teams participating in Math Olympiad contests this year.

Bella H., Howard S., David Z. tied for the team lead in Mrs. Bell's 4<sup>th</sup> grade math class.

The team leader in Mrs. Hunt's 4<sup>th</sup> grade math is Brandon D.

The team leader in Mrs. Wallin's 5<sup>th</sup> grade math class is Mark S.

Jered E. and Andrew T tied for the team lead in Mrs. Hunt's 5<sup>th</sup> grade math class.

Gold Pin awards go to Brandon D., Jered E., Andrew T., Varun M., and Jon W. These students scored in the top 2% of all participating students in Math Olympiad—that's over 100,000 students nationwide!

Silver Pin awards go to Kyle J., Samuel L., Logan M., Nate S., Henry D., Alec E., Nicholas T., Nina B., Ouyang X., Mark S., Grant D., Sam R., Steven S. These students scored in the top 10% of all students participating nationwide.

Out of all schools participating in grades 4, 5 and 6 (that's over 10,000 schools nationwide) Mrs. Hunt's 4<sup>th</sup> grade team placed in the top 20% with a score of 143 points. And Mrs. Hunt's 5<sup>th</sup> grade team placed in the top 10% with a score of 193!

Congratulations to all mathletes who worked hard this year! And a big "THANK YOU!" to the 621 Foundation that sponsored these teams.

## Input Forms Now Available

We are getting close to the time of the year, when we begin the process of determination for classroom placements for fall of '08. Grade levels work very diligently toward the goal of creating balanced class lists which provide each of our students the best of opportunities to learn and grow. Teachers work very hard to ensure factors such as gender, academics, behavior, social strengths and other aspects are considered in creating the class lists.

We would like our parents to feel confident and secure that we take this seriously and consider it to be one of the many important tasks that are done each year. Each of our staff is committed to doing the very best we can. Parent input is valued. You are welcome to communicate to us any specific learning needs of your child. During the class placement process, I share this information with the staff members designing the class lists. Although we know our current students very well, we respect your insights into the learning needs of your child.

There is not a space on the form to indicate your specific selection of a teacher. Placement is ultimately the responsibility of our placement teams and again we take this responsibility very seriously. We will do our best to think through the needs of each child and to plan the best scenario for each of our students for the upcoming school year.

Student/parent input forms may be picked up in the office should you decide to submit. This is strictly volunteer information on your part. Typically, we receive around 20 forms for each grade level per year. I have included a list of all our teachers at each grade level as it is available at this time. Between now and the start of school it may be possible for us to make changes as needed depending on circumstances.
